Project Breakdown

This is a 3-part project and we suggest taking at least 5 sessions to complete.

- **1. Find your Focus- session 1** The group will choose a story to research, using golden documents as a starting point. The group will discover a topic they would like to discuss and investigate further.
- 2. Further Research—sessions 2 & 3—The group will use the documents available, and other suggested resources detailed in each pack, to further research their topic of interest. They will discuss any information still missing, set tasks for each other and work as a team to build on a narrative.
- **3. Create a presentation—sessions 4 & 5**—The group will create a presentation, keeping in mind who their chosen audience is and how best to deliver the research to them. Finally, they will present their work to the larger group or teacher/team leader.

The Enquiry Learning Approach invites you to learn through enquiry, discussion and research based on insightful questioning. This approach encourages your group to discover stories through various sources of evidence and questioning.

Less emphasis on teaching and more emphasis on learning.

Your group will be encouraged to learn and develop at their own pace both as an individual and part of a team. The group members will work together and identify strengths in themselves and their peers. They will also build on any weaknesses in the group such as confidence in communication or comprehension techniques.

Goal oriented learning. Research is a wonderful skill but sometimes it's difficult to know where to start or when to stop. Abertay 25's approach is to encourage a group to find a story or a topic that they find interesting, and research it with the goal of presenting their findings in a fun way to others.

The Abertay 25 education pack also promotes a feeling of community. It depends on group work and thrives when there are different abilities and interests within that group. It encourages self-reflection with quick and easy evaluation forms that will very plainly show how the group's confidence has changed, how their understanding has developed and asks them to focus on enjoyment. The group work and creativity will promote an open, positive and supportive discussion about various potential topics. This includes opportunities for pupils to make their own decisions, contribute as leaders and role models, offer support and services to others and be an active member of the team.

Curriculum Links and Benefits

This interdisciplinary project has the pupil at its centre. It has already been successful in classes led by music, maths, history, drama, geography and religious studies teachers. Each produced a range of creative outputs based on their stories that included art, music, creative writing, drama and more!

It has been designed to build life skills, encourage self-motivation and teamwork, think creatively as well as organise thoughts and information into an output with an audience in mind.

Each story in this pack will be linked to specific learning outcomes from the Scottish Curriculum for Excellence, but you can be assured that the project in its entirety is focussed on creating:
