# Abertay 25 Women in Politics

An Abertay 25 Research Project



## Introduction

#### We will:

Explore the lives of two inspirational pioneering women in Dundee with links to Abertay's history, discover their story and investigate the challenges facing local female politicians in the first part of the 20th century.

#### **Topics of interest:**

Women's rights and history; rise of the Labour Party; Social Studies (History, Citizenship); Health & Wellbeing

#### Learning outcomes:

I know who Lily Miller and Annie Lamont are, and why they are significant to Dundee's history.

I have used evidence to discover their story, understand a timeline and have answered questions as well as created some of my own.

I have used primary and secondary resources to explore answers to my, and my group's, questions.

I have used my, and my group's, research to build a narrative and used the creativity and skills in the group to present this narrative to a chosen audience.

learn about where to find help and resources to inform choices

communicate, collaborate and build relationships

explore and evaluate different types of sources and evidence

The story of Dundee's women in politics shows that the City was not a "Women's Town" despite having a high rate of female employment especially in its textiles factories. The positions of power were still male dominated. It wasn't until 1931 that Dundee elected its first MP, and 1935 when its first female councillor, Lily Miller, was elected. But women before 1931 were highly capable politicians, as the documents about Annie Keir Lamont (telegraphist, poet, and political activist) show. Once elected, they faced the challenge of working and debating in a male dominated council chamber and trying to get their message reported by an equally male-dominated conservative press.

## Teacher's Notes - How to Use This Pack

This project aims to encourage the group members to engage in discussions based around the evidence provided. The more they discuss, the more topics of interest they might come across. For example, they might become interested in how women are portrayed in the media "then & now", or they might want to discover more about female town councillors in Dundee.

This pack provides ideas to help you take a group through a research project by questioning and discussing evidence in archive documents. We have highlighted some questions you might ask to get the discussion started. However, the aim is for the group to take the lead, and for you to be helping it achieve its goals. This can take time, so encourage them to make suggestions and ask questions, and see if they can discover their answers in the given resources. If not, they can keep a note of those questions for further research. Over time they will use their research to find their own direction and build a story that they will tell in a presentation that they design and develop themselves.

Preparing for Stage 1 teacher's notes Each document in this stage has a suggested activity (or two!) to help your groups with their discussions. The purpose of this stage is for the groups to identify the story the documents tell, and find a topic, a person or a theme to focus on for their further research. In their discussions they will identify more questions to research, and take individual responsibility for tasks preparing for stage 2.

## **Stage 1- Find your Focus**

As the groups work their way through the documents, they'll come across the "main characters" of their research.

Before they start, ask each group to draw two large outlines of a person on a piece of paper. As the groups discover more about the people they're researching, they will add the information to the outline, constantly building on their research and discovering areas of interest.

## FIRST WOMAN MEMBER.

Mrs Lily Miller, one of the Socialists returned for the Twelfth Ward, is the first woman member of Dundee Town Council.

The occupations of new members of the Council are:-Mr J. Noble, clerk; Mr C. Buick, general labourer; Mr F. Davidson, foreman joiner: Mr Wm. Black, builder; Mr A. J. Bayne, engine driver: Mr J. Creegan, teacher; Mr G. Croft, insurance agent: Mr P Thoms, french polisher. Polling was heavy all over the city. Of

an electorate of 78,104 in the 10 wards contested the total poll was 52,579. This represented 67.32 per cent., compared with 58.87 last year.

The highest percentage poll was in the Third Ward (Locheo), where it was 73.6.

### WOMAN ENTERS THE LISTS As Candidate for Dundee Council.

Miss Annie K. Lamont and Mr J. Grafton Lawson are possible candidates for Dundee Town Council at the election in November. It has not yet been decided which ward Miss Lamont, who is a prominent member of the Labour party, may contest, but it is likely that Mr Lawson will stand for the First Ward. Mr Wm. M'Farlane, the pre-sent M.E.A. representative in that ward, has intimated that he will be compelled on account of pressure of business to relinquish the seat, which he has held for the past the seat, which he has held for the past three years.

Miss Lamont is well known in many circles in Dundee, while Mr Lawson, it may be remembered, unsuccessfully contested the Eleventh Ward at the last election.

Extract from page 4 of Annie Keir Lamont—Post Office Time Capsule Letter, 1921, Dundee City Archives ref. GD/Mus/226

> The vote has been granted to women within the last few years, and we are very keen about voting, and indeed, most of the women in this office are very anxious to see Winston Churchill turned out of his seat (Dundee) at the next General Election.

Mrs Winterbotham and Lady Astor are our only representatives in Parl[iamen]t, but we hope there will be a Lady Premier before 2021.

## Women's Rights Defended—By Woman

Women's rights were defended by Mrs. Lily Miller at a meeting of Dundee Educa-tion Committee to-day

She asked why applications for the post of superintendent of music had been restricted to men.

Convener Wilson said the fact that a women might be appointed may have been in Mrs Millar's mind, but the whole tenor of the discussion at the sub-committee was of the discussion at the sub-committee was in favour of the appointment of a man. The salary was fixed on the same lines as Mr James Adamson. "If any lady should care to apply I have no doubt we shall be quite interested to receive her application." the convener

added.

Bailie Wm. Reid-You won't get ladies to apply if you advertise for a man, The Convener-Some of them are very

daring. (Laughter.) Rev. H. A. Williamson-The definition of man in the Bible is that God create man-male and female. (Laughter).

Where the group's research takes them depends entirely on them. At this point, the group has curiosity. Some of the questions raised at the end of Stage 1 will not be answered by the documents in the pack, so where can they go to find the answers? First of all, they need to decide which questions they want to answer-they need to discuss and decide on the direction they want their further research to go in. What is it they want to discover and whv?

Examples of further research topics:

There are so many directions for further research in this story. The group might be interested in looking at the evolution of women in politics; looking at women in the media; the connections between Lily and Annie; a timeline of inspiring women in Dundee; media and mental health; using Annie's letter to contrast Dundee "then and now"...

## **STAGE 2 PRESENTATIONS Teacher's Notes**

- The group will need to decide on a few things before getting started on their presentations. We want them to be as creative as possible, using the skills of those found within the group. Is there a confident speaker? A musician? Someone who enjoys arts and crafts? Encourage the group to discuss the different ways they could present their research to an audience.
- On page 16, there are some questions the group could discuss together to help guide them towards a presentation.

### What is your topic?

- The group should agree on the topic of the presentation, the story they want to tell, and the message they want to send.
- Their message should be clear, strong and something that they are confident talking about.
- Are there any local politicians you could interview?

#### Who is your audience?

- How will the group get their message across?
- How will the group's chosen audience benefit from their research?

#### How will you present your discoveries?

- Now they know what their message is and who their audience is, they can focus on the best way to get that message across—what will make the biggest impact.
- A short story, drama, piece of music, animation, artwork, interactive exhibit the possibilities are endless!

### Create!

Once the groups have decided on their message, audience and presentation style, it's time to create! Each member of the group needs a role either in the design or delivery of the presentation (or both!) Before they start, they should make a plan. How long do they have to create their presentations, what equipment and skills to they have—laptops, art supplies, cameras etc. Remember to contact archives@Abertay.ac.uk - we might just be able to help!

Most importantly, the group needs to create realistic goals. They should think about time, resources and skills and what they can actually achieve with the resources available to them.

## Stage 3 - Presentations Group Worksheet

Work through this sheet to help prepare your group presentation. Discuss each of the questions with your group before making a decision. Think about the skills of each person in the group, for example do you have an artist in your group? Or someone who is a confident speaker? Do you have a musician or someone who is interested in video editing? Use what skills and equipment you have available, but make sure everyone has a role in either the design or delivery of the presentation.

#### What is your topic or message?

Discuss the main topic of your presentation. Write your topic in 10 words or less. This will help you decide the title of your presentation. Try to summarise the story you want to tell in a paragraph. This can help you plan how it could be divided up into sections / scenes in your presentation.

#### Who is your audience?

Discuss who you are creating this presentation for. Your school, a nursery, a future employer or politicians? It can be a completely made up audience—someone from the future, the past or even an alien!

#### Why do you think they should listen to your message? How will they benefit?

Your presentation needs a "why". Think about why your audience needs to hear your research. It might help them change their perspective, or inspire them to make a change.

#### How will you present your work?

This will depend on the topic/message and audience you have chosen. A younger audience might benefit from storytelling or rhyme, whereas an alien might need a lot of visual cues. Use the skills in your group to decide on the best way to present.

Discuss realistic goals. What can you achieve with the time and resources available to you. Play to each other's strengths – if one person is an amazing writer, another a great illustrator and someone else is a fantastic speaker – work together to create something you can all feel confident presenting!
